Last month I had the honor to attend the Mochitsuki Taikai in Ottawa, where I have met many Japanese Canadians and Japanese nationals as well as many Canadians who are great fans of Japan. I would like to highly commend the works of OJCA and OJCC for creating a vibrant platform for the people to come together, and also for helping Canadians and Japanese to learn more about each other.

I look forward to closely working with you in the year ahead as we strive to further the mutual understanding between our two countries.
