He is a recipient of the Haiku Museum of Tokyo Award (1983, 1994 and 2003), First Prize in Traditional Style Haiku sponsored by Mainichi Daily News (1992), Sam Ragan Award in the Fine Arts (2006) Raleigh Medal of Arts for Lifetime Achievement (2008), and North Carolina Award for Literature (2014).
